Overall Recovery Funding






Funding Received by Donor






Mine Action and Debris Removal

UNDP, together with **FAO** and **WFP**, <u>tested</u> innovative demining technologies near Izium (Kharkiv region), with the aim of increasing the effectiveness and efficiency of demining efforts.

UNOPS: Over 100 hectares of agricultural land in Chernihiv oblast was cleared of explosive threats to allow farmers to return to work. In addition, local authorities were provided with more than 60 pieces of equipment to support demining operations including pickup trucks, heavy-duty explosive ordnance disposal suits, metal detectors, and portable X-ray systems.

FAO: The assessment of damage to soil caused by the war was launched to measure agricultural land contamination. This vital work is an important step to ensure the safety of agricultural produce.





Infrastructure reconstruction

UNICEF <u>completed</u> renovations in the hospitals in Odesa to improve access to the water in emergencies. This included drilling a well, building a pump station, and installing a reverse osmosis system for a continuous clean water supply.

IOM <u>finished</u> the rehabilitation of the Dnipro National University dormitory with 227 studio apartments now available for displaced people from Mariupol and other cities. The apartments provide IDPs with dignified housing with improved heating, drainage, ventilation and fire safety.

UNOPS: 31 schools were repaired in Kyiv, Chernihiv, Sumy, and Kharkiv oblasts to welcome students back to a well-equipped learning environment in September.

UNDP: The water supply infrastructure in Bucha, damaged during Russia's occupation of the city, was <u>renovated</u> with modern, self-contained equipment that will allow nearly 9,000 city residents to have access to high-quality drinking water.

UNDP completed the rehabilitation of a heavily damaged educational institution in Mykolaiv renowned for training professional athletes, including Olympic champions.

UNDP analyzed satellite and drone imagery to assess damage in over 426 settlements, digitizing more than 1.3 million buildings. This data informed evidence-based recovery planning and UNDP's debris removal efforts. More than 285,000 tonnes of rubble have been removed based on these assessments and Ukraine has established its first debris recycling plant. To support these efforts UNDP provided 52 waste collection trucks and 63 units of heavy machinery for debris removal and municipal waste management to more than 19 communities across Ukraine.



Housing

UNHCR: 1,800 families were supported through a tailor-made rental initiative, that included legal, technical, and financial support, to help them move out of collective sites.

UNHCR provided \$15 million during the course of 2024 todate, to support 90,000 families hosting 250,000 IDPsunder the Prykhystok Programme. Also, 128 families received locally produced prefabricated homes. Overall, 300 modular homes to be delivered in 2024.

UNOPS: Repairs in 345 apartments in Kharkiv are underway with a focus on restoring the structural integrity of the residential units and replacing windows and doors. Common areas and roofs of multi-apartment buildings are also being repaired.



Livelihoods and Decent Job Creation

IOM provided the necessary equipment to run vocational training courses at a garment factory in the Bar community (Vinnytsia region). Over 20 women, including displaced women and veterans' wives, completed the course and can now be employed in the factory.



Enabling Factors

UNDP: Ten representatives of local authorities were <u>trained</u> in July to develop and implement recovery and development plans. Using the knowledge and understanding of gender-sensitive programming, budgeting and impact assessment tools received during the training, the participants are expected to develop at least 2-3 projects for each pilot community.

UNDP: A five-month course to develop student self-government bodies "aGAIN 2.0," concluded in July. During the course, students developed pilot projects, with six of them winning a competition and receiving funding. Seven of the participants will now provide trainings to other youth in order to share their knowledge further within their communities, and more than 300 youth have new skills to be active participants in Ukraine's recovery.



Social protection

UNFPA: 160 police officers received gender-based violence response training in Dnipropetrovsk and Sumy oblasts in June 2024. Additionally, 13 specialized police vehicles and ICT equipment were provided, enhancing support to survivors. From January to June 2024, almost 9,000 people received support with a focus on responsible fatherhood, gender-based violence prevention, and reducing emotional distress.



Energy and Environment

UNDP has supported 103 pilot projects, implemented by 19 energy service companies (ESCO), that focus on increasing energy efficiency, expanding renewable energy, and modernizing public buildings and municipal infrastructure across the country.



Educatio

UNESCO: The guide for teachers, "Teaching and learning with living heritage in Ukraine," <u>was presented</u> in June 2024, involving 600 offline and online participants in the event. The guide focuses on conducting lessons using elements of living heritage, allowing students to foster feelings of identity and increase their appreciation for cultural diversity.

UNICEF <u>launched</u> 16 digital education centers in Odesa, Mykolaiv and Kherson regions, with the goal of improving access to education. Children can attend classes on digital literacy, cyber security, psychological resilience, communication skills, financial literacy and to make up for educational losses.



Health

WHO conducted a two-week Leadership Course for public health professionals in Ukraine. 50 people joined the event to improve their skills and competencies, strengthen leadership qualities, and help identify innovative approaches to solving challenges in the field of public health.

UNDP provided advanced rehabilitation equipment valued at \$1.2 million to strengthen Ukraine's healthcare infrastructure. This initiative aims to improve rehabilitation services for patients affected by the ongoing war. In addition, six specialized vehicles were distributed among healthcare institutions to improve the availability of essential medical services and facilitate access to palliative care for patients.

UNFPA: A Youth Well-Being Index survey was conducted in June 2024. It surveyed 540 young people in Kremenchuk to assess their well-being. The findings will guide local authorities and civil society in designing and implementing targeted interventions to improve quality of life for youth.
